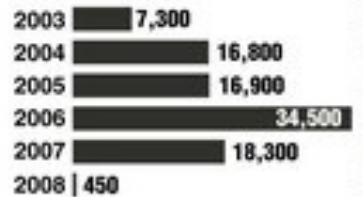
War's toll: Five years in Iraq

The toll: In civilian lives

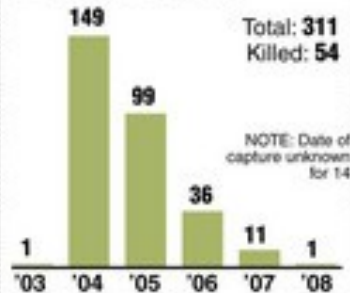

Estimated fatalities, by calendar year from May 2003, when President Bush declared the war over, to January 2008



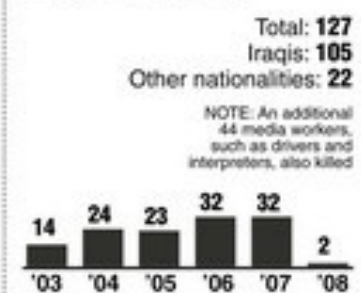
Foreigners kidnapped

Journalists killed

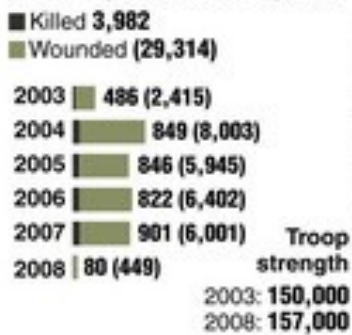
By calendar year, March 2003 through February 2008

March 19, 2003-March 11, 2008



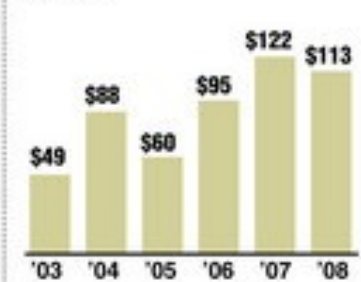

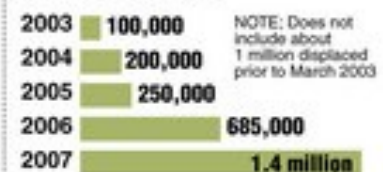
